ST. DAVID'S ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES 2020

St David's Episcopal Church Annual Meeting Minutes January 26, 2020

Meeting opened at 10:30 a.m. with call and response of Psalm 27 and prayer led by Mark Santucci, Interim Rector.

Motion from Kent Harding to accept the role of members, Ken Nogacek seconded. All in favor, motion passes.

Mark indicates that he will move his report to the last item in the agenda so that he has the last the word. Al Schober Motions Susie Forbes seconds to accept the minutes from the February 10, 2019 annual meeting as presented. All in favor motion passes.

Rev. Mark introduces all officers and vestry members and invites Sr Warden Ken Nogacek to give his report.

Ken Nogacek, Sr Warden comments on how well the vestry worked together and thanks Mary Carey for the number of years she has severed on vestry. The vestry accepted Mary's resignation mid-year 2019. He invites all present to please thank her for her time. Other members leaving the vestry are Jeannette Olson who was voted to fill the remainder of Mary's 3rd year term. Scott Stadnicki and Craig Gilbert are also leaving having completed their three-year terms. Also, Ed Fialkosky will be resigning as Jr Warden. Thank you all for your time and service.

An update on the Rector transition, this weekend, we had a candidate in for an interview and we have another candidate that is scheduled for interview. We will be able to report further on the transition once the Vestry has had an opportunity to meet and discuss each candidate further. Ken Nogacek adds that he believes we will have a permanent full time Rector this year (2020). Thank you, Rev. Mark, for your service and support. (all present applaud).

In addition, Ken indicates that we are down to just 4 counters of the financial donations each Sunday and that the Vestry has stepped up to support that ministry.

Rev. Mark introduces Jr. Warden Ed Fialkosky and invites him to present his report. Ed introduces Al Schober, Bill Day and Steve Forbes as members of the building committee who have helped to keep the heat on, the roof repaired, the front door repaired and many other building and grounds odds and ends. Ed state that it has been a pleasure to serve and thanks everyone again.

Treasurer Steve Forbes is called forward to provide his report. Steve opens by saying that it is unfortunate that Bill Day is not here – he is a great assistant – we are a good team and work well together. He helps me keep the Debits and Credit straight. Thank you, Bill (all applaud).

Steve refers everyone to page 12 of the annual report and explains the columns on the CY 2020 Income Budget. He points out various items one of which are the pledges which show a strong financial health of St. David's. The 52 Pledges received are not the same pledges but more than last year.

Outreach – we sent \$412 to the Coast Guard to support them during the shut-down last year. Val Norris

sold off all her paintings before moving back to England, which proceeds she donated to Outreach which was used for Prison Ministry, St Vincent de Paul Christmas Party and the Homeless Hospitality Center. Also thank you to Dennis McKelvey for his support of the Christmas Feast (all applaud). Jill Foster reports that we contributed to the CROP walk which region wide exceeded \$18,000. Steve asks that everyone read Ed Fialkosky's Jr. Warden's report that shows all that has been done to keep the facility running.

Finally, on the last page, we were able to keep a positive cash flow. Unfortunately, we were not able to hire a new Rector in 2019 however we were able to put aside \$34,000 towards the relocation and hiring of a new Rector. Today there is \$108,000 in that account. God is in charge of when the next Rector is hired (all applaud).

Rev. Mark returns to a call and response.

Rev. Mark asks Diane St. Laurent, Director of Christian Education if she would like to add anything to her written report. She stands and announces that she just checked in on all the kids (who are watching a movie in the other room) and they are all still alive.

Anne Ripley asks who the different leaders are in the Christian Formation school and Rev. Mark refers her to Diane.

Rev. Mark refers to the page with the nominations and asks that the officers please stand. He asks that the nominations for Senior Warden, Junior Warden and Clerk be cast as one ballot. Pat Anderson motions that one ballot be cast for all executive officer nominees. Kirk Kirkpatrick seconds. All in favor, motion passes. For a matter of record, for one-year Officer positions, the nominees are Senior Warden-Ken Nogacek, Junior Warden- Scott Stadnicki, Clerk- Chris Curcio and Treasurer- Steve Forbes.

Rev. Mark announces the nominees for Vestry, all stand as they are introduced. Ballots are distributed. All vote. Ken Nogacek, Steve Forbes and Chris Curcio count the votes. The vote results in the following new vestry members to serve a three-year term: Hap Fallon, Jeanette Olson and Ed Fialkosky. Ken Nogacek is nominated as Alternate Delegate to Convention. All in Favor. Motion passes.

Rev Mark reads again Psalm 27 as a call and response. He begins his report by stating that this year, he is in his 32nd month of his two-year assignment. He believes this is the second longest tenure. Susie Forbes adds that we are so glad he is here. Rev. Mark comments that not once in the 32 months has anyone ever said, "no, we can't do that" or "that's not the way it's done". And he says thank you for that. He also thanks us for our Steadfastness, commitment to one another and to St David's and most especially to our Lord. And going forward with confidence to whatever is next. He adds that we have refused to be frustrated by the transition process and that God will reveal what God will reveal when he chooses to reveal it. We are listening not only for who will be called for Rector but where we are being called. We tried on some new things – the last few months we have held a healing service in conjunction with St James Poquetanuck. Jane Nolan, Music Director, put on the best Good Friday service we have ever done and we're going to do that again. Some things have worked great and others just eh. We have made significant strides to our stewardship program and we are very pleased that the program has been advanced and the response to it has been advanced. There is plenty of money in the parish to do what we need. The bad news is it's in your pocket and not ours. We have great program for the kids – it warms his heart to see the kids at the soup kitchen. He indicates he remembers the things he did when he was a kid growing up. We had a great VBS this year. He is thrilled with our worship which takes a great deal of people to make that happen and mentions all the ministries involved. Thank you for all of that. He points out that

the Flower Guild and Altar Guild have gone through changes and members have stepped up to fill in the gaps and thank you for that. He also thanks the officers and vestry. Ken Nogacek and Ed Fialkosky and Chris Curcio and Steve Forbes - we come together to form an executive committee and all members of the vestry who work together. As Ken stated, it's a joy to work with this Vestry - which has not always been his experience at other parishes. Particular thanks to Mary Carey and Craig Gilbert for their service on Vestry and to Ed Fialkosky and Jeannette Olson and Hap Fallon who will be joining us.

Rev. Mark continues to thank all those involved in the service and indicates its important because so many of you are working to make it all happen.

Susie Forbes interjects with a thank you for Father Mark who has stuck with us (all applaud).

To Al Schober and Bill Day who are here more than I am - they are always here to make sure things go as they should go. To the people manning the kitchen.

And to my staff – I am deeply blessed with a wonderful wonderful staff. I could not begin to all the things I do without the hard work of the staff. He introduces Jane Nolan, Robin Martelle, Diane St. Laurent. And Maria Nott, Parish Coordinator who is not here. (All applaud and cheer.)

Last year he quoted his favorite theologian....."Don't worry about what the world needs, go out and do what makes you come alive...

Working with you makes me come alive. And working together makes us all come alive. It's the way the Spirit works. I just want to say thank you for being willing to try new things. We are given as a light to the world that all the world may be transformed. It's not about arriving it's about being on the way. He reminds us of the story about the little boy who is asked 'who are the saints' and remembering the stained-glass windows he indicates the saints are the people the light shines through. (All applaud Rev. Mark for his report and in thanks for his leadership and service.)

Mark asks if there is any new or old business. None heard he asks for a motion to adjourn. Ken Nogacek motions to adjourn Jeanette Olson seconds. All in favor, meeting adjourns at 11:27.

Mark asks that everyone read through the remaining reports contained in the Annual Report.

ADMINISTRATION

Senior Warden Report

Again, it is a pleasure and honor to be able to thank all the members of St. David's for entrusting me with the Senior Warden position again this past year. It is a privilege to be able to serve St. David's in this capacity.

2020 has indeed been an interesting year!!

The Vestry started the year, as we have many of the past years, with The Search Process. The end of 2019 saw us interview candidates via Skype/Facetime in November and December. After the new year we met and discussed our way forward. We had one candidate stand out above the others we had met with and we decided to bring that candidate in for a final interview. As we all know we chose that candidate to be the new Rector. We were very happy to announce that we had chosen the Reverend Jana Branson to be our new rector. She would begin her duties almost 10 years to the day from the time Reverend Baker retired. We were also fortunate enough that Reverend Mark Santucci was happy to continue in his role as PIC until Reverend Jana could begin her role as rector.

I thank Mark for his 3 years of time he devoted to St. David's. His leadership and spiritual presence helped us to maintain our focus on finding the right person to fit with St. David's. Again, THANK YOU Mark for your time and dedication.

In mid-February many members of our vestry joined with other vestrys from the south east region ECCT for a one day retreat at the Incarnation Center, Deep River CT. This day was filled with many activities related to how to engage members of the parish in the church, as well as how we may utilize and share talents between parishes. Many of us left the retreat with renewed vigor in ways in which we not only as vestry but also as individuals may get involved.

Then March rolled around and the nation and world were hit with a pandemic. COVID-19. We had our March vestry meeting and consensus was to continue services that was March 14th. We had in person service on March 15 and the rest is they say history, as it was recommended, we not have in person services to help prevent the spread of COVID.

We have been conducting services via Live Streaming on Facebook since then. Again, I thank Mark. He had an idea of how we could make a live stream of our service work. While she has not yet had a live service with the entirety of our members, she has met many members who have stopped over and done properly social distanced introductions. I look forward to that day when we can give Jana a true St. David's "Welcome Home". I thank Linda Dierman, Meghan Nogacek and Kirk Kirkpatrick, who are completing their terms on the vestry. Thank you for your valuable input, and dedication to the work that you have contributed to your time on the vestry.

I look forward to a time in the not-so-distant future when we can meet in person again. In the meantime, thank you for your support on the live stream and continued support of St. David's.

FINANCE MINISTRY

Treasurer's Report for Calendar Year 2020

Financially, 2020 has been a year of challenges requiring flexibility and attentive management. All 2020 obligations, salaries, and bills were paid on time, and Rev Branson and family were successfully moved to Connecticut from California. Income exceeded expenses by 17,967 for the year. This is due to the Federal Government granting us a Payroll Protection Loan of \$24,000, and parishioners doing an excellent job supporting the parish fiscally. Pledges were essentially on budget, but plate was about \$1,000 behind budget, for which we are grateful considering our circumstances.

Expense category summaries for calendar year 2020 are presented in the following line items:

<u>Christian Formation</u> was over budget \$233. This account is essentially on budget and the money was well spent for the education of our youth.

<u>Worship</u> was under budget \$765. This is primarily due to the reduced expenses in the music department due to a reduction in the activity at services.

<u>Outreach and Mission</u> was under budget \$737. Outreach Pass-Through and Rector's Discretionary are both donations from parishioners not normally allocated by the vestry. These funds accounted for most of the budget difference. The parish is encouraged to support these line items.

<u>Parish Life</u> was over budget \$2,636. This cost growth is associated with the IT support that was required to keep the office and church's network on-line.

<u>Pastoral Care</u> was essentially on budget, except for un-budgeted expenses to support the transition committee. This expense was most welcome and worth every penny.

<u>Wider Church</u> was under budget \$6. This is the Diocese Pledge and reflects monthly round off differences between the Diocese and our books.

<u>Facilities and Grounds</u> was under budget \$6,177. This expense category is usually always over budget but 2020 has been anything but usual. The cost of oil has significantly decreased and building utilization has also decreased electrical and heating costs.

<u>Payroll</u> was under budget \$18,267. This category was significantly below budget due to three factors. Nursey Attendants have not been required since March, Maria moved on to a new full-time job in October and our new Parish Coordinator, Madeline Wilson, is coming aboard with the new year, and Robin has had to restrict her participation at Saint David's music program for health reasons until the fall of 2021, God willing.

2021: The 2021 budget supports a full-time rector, our existing staff, incorporates the Diocese-mandated salary growth due to cost of living, and meets our Diocesan commitment. The three outstanding loans for the new addition to the church could be paid off with assets in savings, but is being deferred until the Fall of 2021 to ensure all factors have been considered. These loan payments are included in our operating budget to support quarterly payment of these non-interest-bearing loans.

The following budget for Parish Ministries is in the Narrative Budget format and has been approved by the Vestry. Points of interest are:

- 1. The budget is balanced;
- 2. The basis of the income and expenses listed is: performance of the accounts in 2020, and known changes such as contracts negotiated with Anderson Oil and Eagle Landscaping for snow plowing, and Diocese related expenses;
- 3. The budgeted pledge amount is based on commitments received and reasonable expectations;
- 4. The budget supports the Diocese's 1.68 % COLA guidelines for clergy and employees;
- 5. The Diocese is advertising at 10% increase in insurance costs this year;

- 6. Outreach is budgeted at \$1,700, but needs to be increased as opportunity presents itself; and
- 7. The ECCT Assessment is budgeted at \$25,629, which is 10% of our 2019 Operating Income.

Lay Readers Activities

A total of 27 different people took part in various aspects of the lay readers' function: reading Scripture, leading the reading of the Psalms, and/or leading the Prayers of Intercession at the Sunday services. On Sunday mornings in the absence of an available priest, Morning Prayer services are conducted by a lay reader. They also, in non-pandemic years, lead Evening Prayer services during Lent.

This number can be augmented by many of the youth and college students of the parish reading Scripture, leading intercessions and preaching during special services. Others have stepped up to read during Facebook services.

There were 17 Lay Eucharistic Ministers who administered the Chalice and two persons, Leslie Aiken and Pete Hall are licensed as a Lay Eucharistic Visitors, allowing them to administer Communion from the consecrated elements to the homebound and those in nursing homes or hospitals. On any given Sunday morning as many as nine different lay persons took part in assisting in the conduct of services at Saint David's Church. All parishioners are encouraged to offer their services as readers.

Altar Guild

In June we said "Goodbye" to Fr Mark and welcomed Rev Jana Branson to St. David's. Fr Mark provided a very welcoming and smooth transition for Rev Jana and her feet hit the ground running. Junior Warden's Report

It has been an honor and privilege for me to serve St. David's as Junior Warden for the past year. I would like to thank everyone for trusting me with overseeing the health of our beautiful church.

We entered 2020 with no immediate capital projects required for the building or grounds. Although we recognized there are some major items in the backlog such as replacement of the front doors into the church and fixing issues in the parking lot, we decided to hold off until we called our new Rector.

Although we have not been able to worship on site for most of the year due to COVID, there is a dedicated group of people keeping the building clean and operational. I would especially like to thank Bill Day, Al Schober, and Steve Forbes for their dedication and expertise on all thing mechanical and building related. Their dedication to St. David's is amazing.

We started the process of upgrading the WIFI throughout the building. We contracted out the installation of 13 drop points to install WIFI extenders throughout the building. To date we have installed satellites in the parish hall, music room, sanctuary, and the rector's office. We will gradually be purchasing and installing the rest over the next year.

COVID hit us in March and we decided to do remote services, which started on March 22nd. Special thanks to Tom Nolan for all his hard work with coordinating the streaming of our Sunday services.

The church was opened to few outside groups during the year for events. Each was required to submit a COVID safety plan, were only allowed a small number of participants, and they were not allowed use of the kitchen.

During the summer, Chris Day approached us with a request to fulfill a community service requirement for his Boy Scout Eagle Scout project. His project involved weeding and spreading new woodchips in the playground area; power washing and leveling the statue in the grove; and repairing, cleaning, and mulching around the picnic tables in the grove area. Chris did a great job and we are thankful for all the work he did on that project.

WIDER CHURCH

Annual ECCT Diocesan Convention October 14-18

Jill Foster, one of our Diocesan Delegates, hopes we have had time to read the daily reports on the ECCT website which describe the discussions and decisive actions made during the five-day virtual Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut this October. www. Ecctconvention.org

The first three days were given to open forum discussions on three specific issues in Connecticut selected by your delegates from those submitted from across our diocese. We met in World Café roundtables to explore in depth understanding of and positive Christian actions to address: Wealth Inequality; Pandemic Changes; and Parish-level Education in Systemic Racism, white supremacy and anti-black bias.

The world café discussions were open to delegates and non-delegates alike and were enriched by a variety of views and proposals for action from an assortment of St. David's parishioners joining with many, many other fellow ECCT members, rising to more than 700 Zoomers enthusiastically listening and exchanging, praying and discerning. We were tasked to form action groups to continue the work of these issues and as was the convention, the Action groups are open to any members of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, and most specifically with the support of each other in our Southeast Region, CT Diocese, and local neighborhood to address the issues from and within our parish level throughout this 2020-2021 twelve months. Linda Dierman, our second lay delegate to Convention, added that the cafés were wonderful. It gave all the opportunity to see how others were working through the pandemic and racism. She adds that she felt the best discussion at the world cafe was imaging what church would look like outside our building... if we used our building for other purposes and took our weekly church services on the road. There were so many great ideas brought forth.

Group follow-through meetings were set for November and December and have begun to meet. Jill Foster reports that she is now participating in one action group for each of the three issues. There are facilitators who coordinate time and Zoom link for meetings and notify participants by email. The groups continue to be open to everyone. These contacts are listed on the ECCT Convention website.

Jill Foster participated in the first of two on November 14: "What can ECCT and its members do to address the issue of wealth inequality, including: Developing a common language to assure that everyone is talking about the same thing; Understanding how it distorts the political decision making of our governments, Understanding how wealth inequality intersects with other issues as racism, classism, etc.; Understanding what is our role in politics as a church; and Understanding how our Christian faith provides a standard for our participation in public life."

The November 19 Action group will meet to begin to define "Which of the pandemic changes we have already made will we KEEP and thereby encourage a continuing culture of discovery in parishes?". [Update + post meeting report -- The goal is to become well-informed and better equipped to communicate God's love in action without delay in community. There was an array of both outreach and worship activities shared within this group as we are learning appropriate ways to make both temporary and sustained changes that grow our faith and serve our neighbors within and beyond COVID-19. Such pursuits as: Sharing resources among several parishes, as Episcopalians and with ecumenical neighbors are desired. Several members reported how they are achieving safe Parish resource drop off-and pickup places inside the building, accessible on a schedule; livestream worship with participants taking turns to read,

intercess, make music, on Sundays and regularly during the week; the digital divide of haves and have nots, and how the lack of interaction on one-way livestream and non-interactive Facebook websites, is neglecting some of our regular and previously active members, the need for website development to reflect daily, weekly activities and opportunities to serve in outreach and inreach, grow in faith. And access to sacred time and space within the church sanctuary for prayer and contemplation arranged for specific days, with parishioner COVID ushers.]

Today, November 11, Jill will also participate in the third group which, along with each Parish, is commissioned by the affirmation of our Convention Resolution to address: "How can parishes educate themselves about the reality of systemic racism, white supremacy and anti-Black bias, and feel compelled to take action as followers of Jesus?" Several opportunities have already taken place since this was first instituted at last year's Convention Resolution with a goodly number of St. David's people participating. This year we are committed to follow-through with specific parish-level as well as cooperative action within and beyond our walls. There is an established Racial Justice, Healing, and Reconciliation Ministry Network in the ECCT Jill has recently joined, having participated with many St. David's people this in several activities throughout the year, one such being this summer and fall with the Southeastern Region ECCT group, exploring our history of racial oppression in southern New England, "Conspiracy" book and local studies; another, the Southeastern Connecticut Cultural Coalition conference "Diversity Equity Inclusion and Anti-Racism" which presented issues of policy and practices in housing and employment, cultural pursuits, and organizational leadership that understand what becoming anti-racist means.

In this Annual ECCT Convention, we resolved to undertake work within our parish to address our understanding and action for Racial anti-bias. The Southeastern Region and diocese of the ECCT will work to support this and encourages our parish use of the many resources available, to which we can contribute, use, participate in, and act upon as part of our Baptismal Covenant and Episcopal faith. It is now up to us to plan how will meet this opportunity this year and account for our activities to the ECCT.
